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

This photo was taken in 1956 when I was a Junior (English major) at Kobe College. Just before I left for Rockford College to study, Dr. Jeremy Ingalls and Dr. Dearing Lewis from RC (both Professors of English) came to visit KC on their way back home from their trip to Europe. At Kenwood House, missionary teachers held a welcome party and I was invited to meet the guests. I must have been so nervous and excited that I don't remember how I came to take a group photo of all the missionary teachers at Kenwood. Many of you have dear old memories with them, don't you?

I treasured this photo for a long time. To be honest, I put it in my photograph box and forgot all about it because this event was just the beginning of my adventurous life that followed. When I went to the U.S. shortly after, the time was only ten years after WWII, and Japan was in the midst of recovery. A lot of things I saw and experienced in the States were quite "new" to me, things I had never seen before.



My trip across the Pacific was by a cargo ship from Yokohama to Portland, Oregon, to Chicago by Northern Pacific, and to Rockford by bus. Believe it or not, I was surprised to see seamless stockings, running hot water, dining in cafeterias, students smoking on campus, people eating ice cream on the street walking, students taking an exam without a supervisor, etc. etc. I



experienced many things in my classes: swimming, canoeing, hockey in Fi-Ed, the dissection of a cat in Zoology, and a field trip to The School of Architecture at Taliesin in Art. A series of memories continue in my mind.

Quite incidentally, I found the photo when I was working as Dean of KCHS. I showed it to Mr. Takamichi Yamamoto, then head officer of the HS, and he immediately made a print with a caption. I hope this will lead you to recall your days at KC and thereafter.

### My History with KCC-JEE: An Interview with Pat Gottschalk

When you first moved to Japan, did you experience any culture shock? What did you love best about immersing yourself in the culture? What was the most difficult part of living abroad for you?

Arriving in Japan was culture shock. I grew up in Kansas and went to college in Oklahoma but had never been outside the U.S. before. I was open to going anywhere — the sooner the better, but I didn't know about 'culture shock' until I was in it. I don't recall that I ever got homesick because I was too busy and too absorbed in Japan. I started an English Bible class as expected at Shukugawa church for college students, and we traveled widely together. They were

delighted to introduce me to special places and customs throughout Japan — such as Nagasaki at New Years and staying in a Buddhist Temple on the Ise Peninsula.

#### Did you have any mentors in Japan or from KCC?

My strongest mentor at KC was Angie Crew. She was such a grounded and kind person but also had high expectations.

In KCC, my mentors were Beulah Scott, Martha Farley and Harold Finley. They were all accomplished, highly skilled and experienced on the KCC Board. They all believed powerfully in the mission of KCC and had a strong sense of appropriate governance. Harold was deeply experienced with investing and managing funds. We could always rely on his astute judgment about managing the KCC endowment and our Board spending decisions. Martha led the recruitment of teachers and started the Homestay Exchange Program. Beulah was wise about administration and kept a balance between innovation and responsibility.

#### If you could create a new program for KCC-JEE today, what would it look like?

I would focus on the renewal of both KC and KCC-JEE in order to build up support for the work of KCC-JEE and its ties to KC. Maintaining the vital tie between the two is important for the future strong credibility of KCC-JEE as well as a modernized view of the education of women. KCC-JEE can easily drift into looking like a friendly dinosaur on the current education scene. It needs to appear vital and innovative, in order to attract young professionals to committees and the Board.

Study abroad scholarships can make KC stand out — as well as KCC-JEE.

Young women in Japan need opportunities. Choosing a college is key to their future. They want to choose the school that can move them forward.

Since KC has two programs that they believe will attract students -Global Studies and Psychology-KCC-JEE could collaborate in offering a study abroad program for each in order to add special attraction to KC. KCC could use these new programs to revitalize its own image and attractiveness. These programs would benefit KCC-JEE as they allow for new relationships with universities.

#### What keeps you busy these days?

I write a monthly interview for our newsletter in our senior building. We attend our granddaughters' softball and basketball games. I knit about 120 hats each year for needy kids and donate them to shelters. Larry and I sing in two choirs. Our 80 member Crescendo chorus performed Kay's honorary piece "Wild and Precious" in March. The lyrics echo the last line of a poem by Mary Oliver which ends with "What will you do with your one wild and precious life?"

I've never stopped being involved in Japan. It influenced our family life immensely-- both my husband and kids — and now my granddaughter is going to Japanese language camp this summer.

Thank you for all you have done for KC and KCC-JEE. We appreciate you and admire how much you have done and continue to do with your 'one wild and precious life!'
